

Manly Ferries

The Freshwater Ferry is an icon of Manly and Sydney harbour. I was elected to fight for Manly. That is why I'm campaigning, against my own Government, to retain more than one Freshwater Class ferry. I welcome the Government's decision to retain one ferry, but one simply won't do. Unfortunately, between 2017 and 2019 the number of people catching the Freshwater Class ferry to and from Manly has dropped by around 15 per cent. Numbers aren't much better on the weekend with average weekend patronage dropping around 12 per cent. Those sad statistics however

are not good enough reason to keep only one Freshwater Ferry. Although as much as we love to look at them. we should catch them too! During the average morning peak the number of people on the Freshwater Class ranges from around 30 first thing in the morning at 6am, to around 280 at its busiest at 8am. For a boat that can carry 1100 people, that's not great. Outside of the busier periods in December and January, you rarely see more than 400 customers on board a Manly

Let there be no doubt, the Freshwater Class ferry is a rite of passage for generations of Northern Beaches people, and it should remain so. The appeal of our grand old Freshwater Class to tourists should not be underestimated and is an important element of our tourism trade. More can be done however to increase how much money visitors spend once they get to Manly as it is dangerously well below the Sydney average and has been for many years. What we need to do is strike a balance between the grand old slow boats and a more frequent commuter service to encourage people back on to the Ferries! Over 300 more services will

be added to the F1 Manly timetable each week - an increase of around 67 percent by introducing the Emerald Class Monday through Friday. These more frequent services will hopefully encourage more people to use public transport and the ferry service. At the same time, we should be retaining more than one boat for weekends, public holidays and busier times of the year. That's what I'm campaigning for. That's what I hope to deliver. Importantly, the newer green and gold Emerald boats also have 140 outdoor seats. bike racks, wi-fi and disability access. They're also far more environmentally friendly than the old Freshwater vessels. Let's get the balance right. Save more than one Freshwater Class ferry and provide more frequency for our commuters.

I'm telling my Government to listen to the people and retain more than one Freshwater Ferry to service our famous Manly to Circular Quay route.

NB Tunnel

In the Tawny's interview with MP James Griffin the subject of the Northern Beaches Link didn't come up. We desperately need an alternative, quick route to the city and lower north shore to avoid the gridlock, waste of time and resources, and the creation of pollution as a result of all having to funnel onto Spit Bridge and labour up Spit Hill as our only link to the city. The personal and environmental costs of these hold-ups must be considerable. The Northern Beaches Link (NBL), if it actually happens, must have ample capacity for clean (electric) public transport options. It seems that the Northern Beaches gets thrown mere crumbs of state-funding as we are seen as a safe 'blue-ribbon' area. The long proposed NBL appears to be a mirage or at least way down the list of government priorities. Completion dates seem to be fluid at best.

The tunnel was not even mentioned in the last recent state budget and the funding is absolutely minimal compared with what gets thrown at the western suburbs for transport and infrastructure with their light rail and fast city links. This lack of funding appears to be because the western

suburbs consist of marginal seats unlike here. It is tempting to think the state government assumes they can take our NB votes for granted and that we'll never question why we end up with no government largesse here (let's not mention the pork-barrelling recently in the news). It would be nice if we were valued as much as other areas of NSW. We don't like being ignored. We need sustainable and modern infrastructure to make our transport system efficient now and into the future. Has the Link been quietly removed from future planning?

Balgowlah Bus Debacle

With no community engagement or risk assessment, Transport for NSW (TfNSW) is putting children's lives at risk by deciding to run peak high frequency bus services

straight through the quiet residential streets of North Balgowlah and Seaforth. These changes are due to occur on the 20th December when everyone least expects it. Merry Christmas! Local residents are angry and concerned there will be significant increases in incidents and injuries, and they'll be saddled with longer commutes and reduced accessibility via the removal of key local, Express City and North Sydney bound services that have been servicing the community for up to 4 decades. The major concern is the additional risk placed upon pedestrians and children who use the local areas. The adoption of an existing local bus route, that already poses significant safety risks, illustrates the incompetence of some desk jockey's desperate attempt to add value. The question needs to be asked - how can TfNSW justify these changes given the evidence put forward by concerned local residents looking to retain the status quo? The lack of community engagement and timing of these changes demonstrates TfNSW's arrogance and contempt for communities they are meant to represent. Despite many attempts to engage with TfNSW locals have received little but lip service and we hear our local Council and MP has similarly been left in the dark. Outrage Over Plan to Scrap Classic Manly Ferries

The State Government wants to scrap all but one of the classic Manly Ferries and replace them with smaller vessels made in China but community outrage is powering a grass roots campaign to save the world-famous Manly

President of the Good For Manly Association and Northern Beaches Deputy Mayor Candy Bingham is running the campaign to have the decision reversed. She says the public need to have their say, and any decision must consider the estimated \$500M in tourist dollars that the iconic large ferries bring to Manly and the Northern Beaches every year.

"The community is in shock," Cr Bingham said. "The proposal by the Transport Minister to keep just one of the 1100-passenger large Freshwater Class ferries, with the rest to be replaced by three 400-passenger Emerald class catamarans, just doesn't make sense. It appears that the focus is on commuters and that the large tourist

passenger numbers during peak visitor periods have been overlooked." She added, "The decision to keep just one Manly Ferry is like demolishing the Sydney Opera House but retaining one sail for tourists to photograph".

The tourist numbers are big. Last Australia Day 80,591 people visited Manly by ferry; over last year's 4day Easter weekend there were 257.960 ferry visitors: and on average 47,000 people come to Manly by ferry each day during Summer. A total of 2.8M visitors came by ferry during 2019, with one million of those coming from overseas.

Northern Beaches Council, which strongly backs the campaign, estimates the tourist economy is worth

\$500M a year to Manly and the Northern Beaches area. It also accounts for 12% of local jobs. "The large ferries are the life-blood of Manly. Since the 1850s they have serviced this popular tourist destination bringing millions to enjoy our seaside resort. The Fast Ferries are used by commuters, the large ferries are used by day-trippers and those who enjoy the experience of the leisurely 30-minute trip to Manly," explained Cr Bingham. President of the Manly

Business Chamber, Charlotte Rimmer, said the Chamber stands right behind the Northern Beaches Council to have the Freshwater class ferries retained. "The economic value that the large ferries bring to Manly is enormous. We are concerned this decision has not considered the value of the tourist dollar that this internationally recognised attraction brings. When you come to Sydney you come for the Opera House, the Harbour Bridge and a ride on the Manly Ferry. This decision is like

removing the cable-cars from San Francisco."

According to Paul Garrett, Assistant Secretary of the Sydney Branch of the Maritime Union of Australia (MUA), the large ferries undergo a major service every 5 years. The Freshwater is due for service in February, with the Queenscliff due in October. The Narrabeen is scheduled for service in November 2022 and the Collaroy in October 2023. The fear is that the ferries won't be serviced at all - they will be scrapped instead. NSW Transport Minister, Andrew Constance, has already indicated the Freshwater could be stripped, sunk and used as a diving site.

"These ferries are only 40 years old and still have decades of service left in them," Mr Garrett said. "The NSW Government is currently refurbishing the First Fleet class ferries, which are of the same age. This could also be done for the Freshwater class ferries".

Cr Bingham believes that rather than seeing expenditure on maintenance and life-extension programs for these Freshwater ferries as a cost, the NSW Government should see it as an investment in an iconic tourist drawcard. "The Manly ferries are an internationally recognised Australian Institution. They must remain."

7 Manly Ferry Tidbits to Ponder

1. Pragmatic, Transparent Leadership

The NSW State Government has a strong history of consulting widely with the community to outline clear, logical, bulletproof reasoning before hastily making any major decisions. Just ask amalgamated councils, Crown Casino developers, inner city hospitality entrepreneurs and the greyhound industry, they'll all back me up.

Can you imagine that in a Chinese Cat twice as big and half as manoeuvrable? I hope you like catching the bus from Manly to the big smoke because you'll be riding it a lot more frequently when the safety experts deem the Emerald replacements a disaster in the making anytime the ocean flares up a tad.

3. Boat Engines Seize Up If You Don't Use Them

The proposal to simply keep one Manly Ferry sitting in the docks, resting up nicely for use on weekends and summer holidays is like that mate we all have who thinks he can just flick the switch on his boat whenever he likes, and she'll be right mate. Ah no, she won't buddy. Juxtapose any antique tinny marching back and forth twice daily between Church Point and Scotland Island, dependable as death and taxes, with the silly Billy overpaid bonehead whose rare use of his marine craft is matched with perfect reciprocity to how often said craft needs expensive repairs and maintenance. The Manly Ferries either march back and forth all day every day like stoic ANZAC soldiers we love so dearly, or they die. 4. You Can't Rush Perfection

The iconic Freshwater class Ferries provide a half hour harbour crossing 'experience', a thousand carefree light years beyond serving as a mere means of commuting 7miles from A to B or CQ to MW, as the case may be. This journey is ranked in the Top 5 Ferry Trips on Earth for good reason, it's spectacular, life-affirming, and a proven drawcard to millions upon millions of happy ocean crossers. The classic double-ended, green and gold, ocean-going beauties are unlike any other ferry on the harbour or in the world. To set in motion a poorly thought out plan that will all but kill these icons is an ophthalmic lesson in frightful myopia that 2020 should never be affiliated with.

5. It's about the Economy, Jobs 'n' Growth

The NSW Government has not provided any business case to back their Ferry Burial decision while the Northern Beaches Council estimates the tourist economy is worth over \$500M a year to Manly and the Northern Beaches with 12% of Northern Beaches local jobs dependent on tourists. If the classic Ferries go, will we still see the same mammoth numbers of tourists coming here? Doubtful, seeing as 98% of visitors travelling to Manly by ferry choose the classic Large Ferry. Over 2.8 million people travelled to Manly by ferry in 2019, the busiest route in Sydney, with one million of those being international tourists. If you own a local business, employ local people, would you risk turning away 2.8 million customers a year?

6. The Grace and Efficiency of Double - Enders

The Freshwater class Ferries are big, able to carry 1,100 passengers, providing gangways for huge swathes of people to hop on and off in a way the Fast Ferries and the Emerald Cats can only dream of. The Government logic appears to be the Emerald Cats will be faster, a 20minute journey instead of 30, and more frequent, 300 more services each week, thereby overcoming the disparity of their 400 passenger capacity versus Manly Ferry's 1,100. But how many back-and-forth, high-frequency boats can a Quay handle? Do we really want more ferries doing U-Turns to get in and out of a tight loch? The wonder of Manly Ferries is not only their single-hull design to cut through pounding swells, but their double-ended grace to pull in, drop off, pick up, pull out, saving time, saving hassle. Supreme efficiency. Impeccable design. Worth holding on to.



Having been forced like so many Sydney schoolkids to venture out to Wisemans Ferry for camps and gruelling treks of alleged self-discovery, John and his team were privy to crucial intel; there's no wind at Wisemans Ferry. Thanks to a series of cliffs and gorges, the same place that made summer camps a near death experience with hopes of a cooling breeze nigh on impossible turns out to be

one of the world's best placed valleys for glassed-off surfing nirvana.

Not content to rest on immaculate waves alone. Wisemans Surf Lodge will be surrounded by a 9-hole golf course, 54 hotel suites, a restaurant, bar, and conference facilities, able to offer surfer and non-surfer an idvllic domestic escape to the natural beauty of the region.

The Wisemans Surf Lodge team equate the evolution of perfect wave-generation technology with Averill Harriman's 1936 invention of the chair lift, transforming skiing from an activity confined to the ultra-keen, ultra-fit devotees content to hike snowcapped mountains for a single downhill ride, and bringing it to the masses, allowing the removal of arduous uphill slogs, replacing it with pure downhill joy, and creating a mammoth ski resort industry in the process.

We'll have to wait until 2022 to see the Surf Lodge truly come to life and start pumping waves. We'll also have to wait until 2021 for details to be revealed of the membership model being put in place for access to the wave garden. Sydney surfers know how rare it is for all the conditions to coalesce and allow us to ride perfect waves close to home. Utilising technology to make flawless waves an on-demand, nearby reality... thank you!

Christmas Foods That Ruin a Pet's Christmas

I'm lucky enough to work as a veterinarian on the Northern Beaches, looking after people's dogs, cats and rabbits, as well as our sick and injured wildlife. As a result of this year's COVID pandemic, many more people have been working from home and found they now have the time to dedicate to a family dog. Take a stroll around the traps and you can't help but notice all the puppies enjoying the Northern Beaches lifestyle. But as we enter the festive season, and stock our homes with an array of delicious foods, I thought it would be worth discussing some of the common culprits that are toxic, and potentially life-threatening, for our four-legged friends.

Chocolate

Like us, most dogs love chocolate and can smell it long before they see it. The major toxin in chocolate is the bromine. The amount of theobromine varies greatly with the type of chocolate (the darker the chocolate, the higher the concentration of theobromine). The clinical signs of chocolate toxicity vary from gastro-intestinal signs (diarrhoea and vomiting) through to seizures, and in severe cases, even death. I had a gorgeous Labrador puppy in last week after his owners suspected he had eaten all the chocolate from the advent calendar. After making him vomit he brought up all the chocolates (as well as most of the wrapping and cardboard) and had a very guilty look on his face.

Christmas ham

Unfortunately, I see more cases of gastritis and pancreatitis in the weeks following Christmas than at any other time of the year. Most owners will tell me they fed their pet the leftovers from the Christmas ham and their dog became ill in the following days. The high-fat content of this meat can cause pancreatitis, particularly in dogs who are not used to such a rich meal.

Grapes, raisins, sultanas and currents

If eaten, these can cause acute renal failure and death in dogs. The unusual thing about grape toxicity is that not all dogs are affected, and the toxicity does not appear to be dose

dependent. This means some dogs can eat a whole bunch of grapes and not be affected, whereas others may only eat a few and end up developing kidney failure.

Onions, garlic and chives

These plants contain compounds which when metabolized by dogs can cause damage to red blood cells. You will notice that your dog seems depressed, lethargic and may have pale gums. For this reason, you should avoid feeding your dog foods such as gravy, if they include onions or garlic.

Please note that this list is not exhaustive: these are just some of the potentially harmful foods that dogs may decide to sample over the festive period. Others include Macadamia nuts, avocado, mango seeds and corn cobs.

If you suspect your pet has eaten something potentially dangerous please contact your local vet immediately, as rapid veterinary attention may be lifesaving for your dog.

If the idea of becoming a "Citizen Scientist" floats ver boat but you don't know where to start, don't worry. We have the technology! What's more, you'll soon be able to go for a bush walk and actually figure out exactly what you're looking at! Plus, you can contribute research-quality data and help protect our beautiful environment at the same time. It's all part of a project initiated by local environment group the "Save Manly Dam Catchment Committee" (SMDCC). And you too can get involved, just by taking photos!

First, download the iNaturalist Australia App and sign up www.inaturalist.ala.org.au

Then, search for the Manly Dam Biodiversity Project where you'll see all the amazing images of plants and animals that have already been registered. (The pics have to be taken within the Manly Warringah War Memorial Park or Mermaid Pool boundaries - and please keep to recognised paths!)

When you take photos within this area and upload them, you'll receive help with identifying species, which is no easy task - In a recent report, the Australian Conservation Foundation revealed 25% of Australia's nationally listed threatened plants and 46% of threatened animals can be found in our urban areas and for 39 threatened species these urban areas are the last remaining places in which they exist. That's why protecting places, such as Manly Dam, is absolutely crucial! - Your great nature

photos will then be automatically added to the project's data and verified by experts.

All information gathered assists conservation, education and management and, naturally, if you find a rare species or one previously unrecorded, celebrity status, David Attenborough film roles and international public speaking engagements are assured.

That name again, the "Save Manly Dam Catchment Committee" (SMDCC, yeah you know me, Naughty by Nature O.P.P.) has additionally received a Federal Government grant, facilitated by Zali Steggall MP with Northern Beaches Council and ACF also contributing, THANK YOU!! This has allowed the SDMCC to commission the best flora and fauna experts in Australia to conduct professional surveys of the Manly Dam environs, something that has never been comprehensively done before.

And we have some truly awesome things living amongst us: The nation's cutest animal, the Eastern Pygmy Possum, a fragile resident taking pride of place on the project logo created by local artist Brentos @artofbrentos. There are also Fishing Bats, Climbing Fish and a plant that is found nowhere else on Earth the Seaforth Mint Bush.

Know this 1: SMDCC has campaigned against many developments that have threatened the park's environment over the years (winning some and losing some). If the Beaches Link tunnel is approved, in its current form, it means bulldozing over 10 hectares of bushland along Wakehurst Parkway for road widening and excavation. An Environmental Impact Statement has been released with all the gory details.

Know this 2: Manly Dam wall was built in 1892 to provide a water supply for the small settlement of Manly. To safeguard the newly created reservoir from pollution, its surrounding water catchment was consequently strictly protected. Our society inherited a pristine bushland sanctuary, rich in Aboriginal heritage and glorious enough to be declared a War Memorial Park to honour our veterans. Manly Dam Reservoir is the last body of unpolluted freshwater in Sydney where it is still safe to swim.



Once on board, a man allegedly approached one of the boys sitting on the back seat of the bus. slapping him across the head, unprovoked, before pushing another innocent teen, knocking the kid's new Samsung A51 mobile to the ground and smashing it to pieces.

Concerned passengers began to shout and scream at the man, "Leave the kids alone!" 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How to Have a Wildlife Friendly Summer Garden

Our wildlife need the same basic things we need - food, water, warmth and safety (thanks Professor Maslow). They also need a home, access to food, and protection from harm (predators) and the elements as they move around or hunker down for the day. It's a tough world out there and summer poses extra problems:

1. Staying cool

Wildlife can suffer from dehydration and heat stress. They may be found on the ground. weak and confused with an open mouth and open wings, not moving to shelter. To help, provide shade and water and keep your pets away while they recover.

A shady birdbath/water station at various heights is the best thing you can provide in your garden. Mist spray your hose in the wind to cool an animal slowly but NEVER hose them directly and never pour water directly into an animal's mouth.

If their normal shelter is heating up (under that hot tin roof), cool it by placing shade or wet towels over the top or some cool water within reach.

If the animal is lethargic or

semi-conscious then pick it up in a towel and pop in a box in a cool area. If you are concerned take it to a vet or ring a wildlife rescue service. Long-term, consider planting shady trees and shrubs for shelter. Wildlife carers or your local council can provide you with a list of suitable native plants.

2. Finding water and drinking in safety

Provide water stations of different depths and heights for a variety of species. Make sure there is shelter and a way out for any smaller animals if they fall in: Pebbles or sticks in a birdbath or ramps or ropes for bigger waterbodies.

Swimming pools are also a great source of water - most animals can swim should they fall in, but they need a way to

get back out. You can buy a floating platform, use a floating mat or tie a piece of rope to the fencing and drape it into the pool, making sure the knot is at the water's surface. Check your pool daily and call a wildlife rescue if you are concerned.

3. Hot roofs and gutters

After a few hot days our metal roofs, gutters, fences and other metal objects that may be wildlife highways can burn feet. If you see wildlife on the ground, their burned paws and claws may prevent them to climb or perch. This needs medical treatment. Get them to a vet or call wildlife rescue group.

4. Keeping away from non-wildlife friendly netting

Unfortunately a lot of wildlife food has been removed for our housing and plants. Some people put up fencing and nets to inhibit wildlife eating domestic flowers and fruit. If you can stick your little finger through the netting and it is not tightly secured, it is capa-

ble of causing serious entanglement and injury. This is not only traumatic for the wildlife, but for wildlife rescuers too. having to cut creatures out of trapped entanglements and deal with the serious injuries.

5. Tidying up gardens: tree lopping, mowing and whipper-snipping hiding places

Always check for nests before tree trimming, and poke a stick through tall grass before getting stuck in with that power tool. We rescue birds and possums that have fallen from their nests when branches get lopped, bandicoots and blue tongue lizards that have been whipper-snippered or mowed over, as well as possums that have been cut by chainsaws and hedgers.

6. "Interesting" visitors

A garden with lots of wildlife is a healthy and productive garden. Birds eat insects, insects eat insects, bandicoots turn the soil and eat insects. bats and bees and birds pollinate, and eat insects, but sometimes you can get visitors (you think) you don't want. These can include non-native rodents, but remember Australia has plenty of native rodents and small marsupials. PLEASE don't use poisons as you could kill native rats, lizards or possums

that eat bait, or our owls or tawny frogmouths that eat the baited animals.

Don't use nasty sticky paper that trap our small birds and mammals. If you need to get rid of non-native rodents have a look online for humane trapping or talk to pest control about targeted removal.

There are some visitors you do want, even though you think you don't. These include some of our spiders and snakes.

Reptiles are more active in summer, and you may find them wandering through your backyard. They do a fantastic job of removing rats and other unwanted visitors free of charge and really only ask that you leave them in peace to do their job without interruption.

We have a number of snakes on the Northern Beaches and not all of them are "6foot brown snakes". There are many small and innocuous species that use our gardens as their homes. The harmless blind snake, which often gets rescued from the pool filter box, lives a mostly subterranean existence eating termite larvae and other pest insects. Diamond pythons may live in your garden or roof-space performing the rodent extermination service.

If you do see a snake in vour garden, don't panic. Remove your pets and children and allow the snake time to recover and pass through. If it doesn't pass through, call Sydney Wildlife Rescue for advice. We have volunteers

who are happy to identify different species of snakes living in your gardens and we can often allay any fears about their intentions.

Snakes generally don't move through if there is food or good habitat. So, if there's nowhere to hide (debris, wood piles, long grass) they generallv won't stav.

When gardening wear sturdy boots and gardening gloves and don't leave your shoes outside.

If a snake does enter your house, again, don't panic. Remove pets and kids, close the door to the room the snake was sighted and place a rolled-up towel at the bottom of the door to stop the snake escaping. Call Sydney Wildlife for advice or professional snake-catching company to have it relocated. Keep an eve on the snake's whereabouts to reduces the snake-catcher's need to turn your house upside-down in an effort to find the hiding critter.

And never try to catch or kill ANY snake. Not only are they a protected species but it is well documented that most snake bites occur when the tough guys attempt to attack or remove them.

Who's to blame for birthing on our backs?

France's King Louis XIV is responsible for millions of women adopting a birthing position that goes completely against every ounce of anatomical sense.

Known for his womanising, Louis fathered 22 children with his wives and a swathe of mistresses. At the time it was normal for women to birth using a birthing stool a type of chair which allowed the woman to maintain an upright position and take advantage of gravity to help move the baby down the birth canal. For King Louis, this just wouldn't do. He became increasingly frustrated by the obstructed view posed by the birthing stool. If history is to be believed he wanted to see his offspring being born, quite literally!

Being the King meant his demands were quickly met for the stool to be abolished and replaced by a 'birthing table' replete with stirrups to yank the woman's pesky legs out of

the way and make for much better viewing.

The King's new birthing method made childbirth far more painful because lying on a table reduces the space available in the pelvis by an incredible 28-30%. That space is crucial. Lying on your back to give birth essentially means the mother is pushing uphill against gravity while the stirrups lock the lumbopelvic girdle as tight as a chastity belt at a point in time where mobility is king, not the perve watching on.

Despite this being the worst position for a woman to give birth in, it became popular as lower classes began to hear of the upper class adopting it and assumed it was a sign of nobility and prestige.

It's no surprise that it was around this time that instrumental delivery began, with the invention of forceps. Pain relief also became more widely used. When Louis threw out the birthing stool he also threw out the role that gravity and movement play in helping the baby move effectively through the birth

Many women who are likely to be new grandparents today will be reading this and possibly grimacing at the memory of having to birth on their backs. They may have had pain relief, but epidurals were not in wide use so they had little choice, but to assume this position despite it possibly being against all of their natural instincts.

Today many hospitals and birthing parents recognise the importance of movement, gravity and positioning for labour and birth. When birthing in an upright position the baby is 54% less likely to become distressed, emergency c-sections are reduced by 29%, episiotomy rates are reduced by 29% and there is a reduced need for pain relief such as epidurals. Many women who choose to have epidurals are also being encouraged to use side-lying positions to create more space in the pelvis.

If you're likely to be birthing soon, remember to work with your baby, your body and gravity. And if Prince Charles invents a new birthing apparatus - tell him to stick to his royal duties and leave the birthing to the women.

The Social Dilemma

Movie Review

Lasked Tawny delivery walker, 16 year old Madeline, to review The Social Dilemma and share her insights on growing up in a digital-obsessed world, where the screens we're all glued to are being manipulated to transform our personalities, viewpoints and behaviours.

The internet has seeped into our lives so deeply that it's usually impossible for many people to live their lives without it. It's used for everything from schoolwork, to online gaming, you can even pay your taxes over the internet. If you went outside and asked a stranger on the street if they'd ever used the internet, they would most likely look up from their phone and say that of course they have. Technology is ingrained into our lives as the social norm, so at this

point not many people see anything wrong with it.

This is where The Social Dilemma comes in. The Social Dilemma is a 94 minute eve opening documentary on Netflix. Directed by Jeff Orlowski, it gives an inside look at what goes on in the tech industry behind the scenes, and often, in front of our very faces. Candid interviews from developers and CEOs from some of the most famous technology and social media companies; including Twitter, Instagram, Google, Apple and Facebook.

The Social Dilemma focuses on the rabbit hole that is social media and their creators, their ulterior motives and predatory business models. The most successful apps utilise how your brain works in order to properly design how a notification will look, to tweak your interest and then set an algorithm that keeps you scrolling. Your device remembers everything vou search, even sometimes

things you say out loud in conversation, and then tailors advertisements and articles that are exactly what you are looking for before you even realise. Creepy right? Your phone is a spy in your pocket. The documentary speaks at length about how companies like Apple and Microsoft have used these strategies to grow their empires to the US\$2 trillion they are worth today. Not only is social media a

monopoly that preys on your attention, The Social Dilemma documentary also highlights the disturbing effects that it has on its users, its youngest ones in particular. The co-creator of the Facebook 'Like' Button, Justin Rosenstein, comments on how he is saddened that the feature he created to spread positivity on the site is now an epitome of self-worth for some. It's hard not to be discouraged by getting 10 likes on a post when Kylie Jenner is getting 250,000 and sadly young people's mental health is suffering due to these unrealistic expectations. The increased rate in which young people are self-harming, and even committing suicide has a direct correlation to the introduction of social media. A fact that has not escaped the people interviewed on this doco, which is why their ethical concerns have resulted in them not only leaving these corporate powerhouses but also stipulating that their own children don't sign up for social media.

This documentary is worth a watch. It's truly mortifying to see how much technology controls us like puppets. Judgement Day is here, and the enemy is not the Terminator like you thought it was.... it's in your pocket!

Raise the Spit, Keep the **Eastern Bloc Out!**

Pan-Spit tensions are red raw after a border dispute showcased the deep-seated animosity between Sydney's North and East photographers.

On a recent pristine morning with Instagram snappers

desperate to nail the perfect shots of beachside rockpools, TEBSC (The Eastern Bloc Sunrise Crowd) claim they were illegally refused entry 'roadblock' style to the Insular Peninsula.

Professional photographer and saboteur Stef told The Shutter Priority, "Someone ripped into the Spit's fuse box, made sure she didn't come down till cloud cover rolled in and turned a primo morning into a grey and glum photographer's nightmare. It wasn't me."

It's no secret TEBSC are bored beyond belief, as too are their dwindling Instagram followers, with posting pics of their 'one famous beach' at Bondi and that 'one famous pool' at Bronte.

"It's all they've got," laughed Stef, cackling a little too gleefully for his earlier declaration of innocence to be taken with anything but 10,000 Alanis Morrisette ironic spoons of salt.

"The Northern Beaches is the focal point of the Sydney photography scene. We don't need Bronte wannabes swanning over here to steal precious Instagram likes that rightfully belong to locals."

Police were called to the scene to investigate an alleged burnout by one of the Eastern Bloc. "The skid marks were pretty underexposed", said the Constable, "very common for photographers from Bronteeeee". Police are looking into those leading lines.

The North Remembers... Manly Ferry, King in the North!

History in the Making By Richard Michell

Barney Kearns started a Manly ferry service in 1830, operating an on-demand transfer by sailing boat between Balmoral and Manly, but the operation we know today, with ferries between Circular Ouav and Manly, was started in 1853 by Henry Gilbert Smith. He sought to encourage land purchasers and day trippers to his newly laid out Brighton village and was wildly successful. Both the village and the ferry prospered. By the late 1850s half a dozen vessels operated on the route.

Brighton and Manly Steam Ferry Company formed in 1865, operating a 63ton, purpose built, double-ended steel paddle steamer, the Phantom. Its funnel was painted white with a black top. The colour scheme and double ended design became synonymous with Manly ferries. In 1877 the company re-organised as the Port Jackson Steam Boat Company and commissioned a vessel from Scotland, the pad-

dle steamer Fairlight, starting on the Manly run in 1879 with a top speed of 12 knots. Its appearance and layout set the template for future ferries.

In the 1890s, passengers enioved cheap food, orchestras and, on the Brighton, access to a wine bar complete with an aviary of canaries. In 1907, the Port Jackson and Manly Steamship Company Ltd. was formed and ran the service for the next 70 years. With the 1903 introduction of a tram network radiating out from Manly Wharf, residential settlement grew, the transport network expanded rapidly up the Peninsula. Commuter traffic rivalled holidav.

From 1910 to 1952 eight ferries were purpose built or modernised to service the demand. The flagship was the South Steyne. Built in Scotland in 1938 it was 1,203 tons and could carry 1,781 passengers! In 1971 the operation attracted a takeover bid by Brambles Industries Limited.

but the new owners had little interest in the ferry service, attracted by other activities of the company which included servicing offshore oil rigs.

At the time of the takeover there were four ferries in operation - South Stevne. North Head, Bellubera and Baragoola. In 1973 the Baragoola was withdrawn and in early 1974 Brambles announced that the Bellubera was also to go, causing public outrage and a Save the Manly Ferries campaign. Petitions containing tens of thousands of signatures were delivered to state parliament and, after various twists and turns, the State Government took over operations, but would operate only two ferries - North Head and Baragoola.

This didn't work and in 1976 the government announced it would build three new ferries - the Freshwater class. The first, the Freshwater, was commissioned in 1982 and was followed by the Oueenscliff in 1983 and the Narrabeen in 1984. A fourth, the Collarov, was added in 1988. The style of these ferries was in the tradition of the old ferries and they have proved popular with passengers.



Cheeseburger **Spring Rolls**

Recipe by J.B&SONS

One of our most popular and delicious snacks are perfect for a party with mates or a really, really sad night home all alone. Inspired by the delicious version at Ms. Gs in Potts Point.

Ingredients (makes 20 Spring rolls)

700g beef mince, cooked 14 slices of burger cheese, cut into three strips 200g pickles, diced 1/2 small brown onion, diced 200g burger sauce 1 packet of spring roll paper 1 egg, beaten


Method

- **1.** Take your spring roll packet out of the freezer to thaw
- **2.** Season, then cook your beef (bbq or frypan), constantly mixing and chopping as you go
- **3.** Place cooked beef (and all the delicious juices) into a large mixing bowl
- **4.** Add the onion, pickle and 100g of burger sauce to the bowl, mix well and chill
- **5.** Take one spring roll paper and wrap the rest in a damp cloth to stop them drying out.
- **6.** Place the paper in a diamond shape and put one slice of the cheese horizontally at the lower end of the diamond (halfway between the midpoint and the bottom)
- **7.** Place one heaped tablespoon of your beef mixture on top of the cheese, then place another piece of cheese on top of the beef to create a little stack
- **8.** Take the bottom corner of the paper and roll it up and over the stack, tucking it tight against the other side

- **9.** With some downward pressure, roll the stack forward until just past the midpoint
- 10. Fold in the edges and then roll the remainder up to the top corner, trying to manipulate it into a cylinder shape as you go
- 11. Seal the top corner with a brush of egg wash, set aside and repeat
- 12. Cook until the spring roll paper is crispy and the cheese is ready to ooze!
- **13.** Serve immediately with remaining burger sauce for dipping

Notes

- Good beef from your local butcher will need only salt and pepper. Chuck/brisket blend should give you the perfect fat and flavour ratio - We make our own pickles (and it's easy, you
- can too) but any Bread & Butter pickle is fine - Grab any supermarket burger sauce or make
- your own. Ours is a mixture of American Mustard, Tomato Sauce, Aioli, and Secrets
- For best results fry in oil at 170-180 degrees. Alternatively cook in an oven at 180 for 12-15 minutes, checking and turning halfway
- If you want to be very 2020, you could cook them in your air fryer too, just don't forget to tell all your friends about it!
- Will keep for a day or so in the fridge, but can be made ahead and frozen before cooking

Tawny's Bathtub Bookclub **by** Paige Turner




The Motion of the Body Through Space, Lionel Shriver


