Diversity, Unity and Voice

An alternative viewpoint should be put in response to the letter by Paul Baker (Acknowledgement of Country, Dec '22). Two issues were raised; firstly, the acknowledgement of country and indigenous flags being divisive and secondly that poor treatment happened a long time ago and by implication is no longer relevant. If Australia is to engage in effective nation building it is essential that Australia and Australians recognise the continuous occupation of these lands by 500 aboriginal tribes with 250 distinctive languages. The traditional owners never ceded ownership of these lands and division is already ingrain and will remain until truth telling, treaty and Voice are implemented. The problem is that many are happy with the current division and inequality or remain blind to this division/inequality. It is common internationally for those who have benefited from colonisation to conveniently ignore history and its ongoing legacy. The damage done by past history is ongoing; the loss of identity, loss of culture, loss of language, loss of connection to country and unequal treatment by many institutions including the police and law courts.

Many events are very recent, namely the stolen generation and destruction of sacred sites. It is useful to note that it was only in 1984 and 1986 that the last aboriginal tribes came out of the Western Desert region of central Australia to confront western culture for the first time. It is relevant to examine the writings of Dr David Scrimgeour who attended the event in a medical capacity. He highlighted the importance of Aboriginal autonomy for the health and welfare of indigenous people. You only need to visit indigenous communities in Arnhem land, central Australia and the Kimberly's to recognise the importance of culture to first nation people. It is not in their interest to be completely absorbed into western culture.

Many, unfortunately, see diversity equating to division. It is essential to embrace diversity if we are to build bridges between western culture and first nation culture. So, we can be united in a respectful manner.

Few, if any, new facilities have all positives. I consider the B-Line buses to have many and be a great addition to the public transport offerings on the Beaches. Many have questioned why we have no train line. Imagine the cost, the construction disruption, the land and property requirements for the line and stations, etc. The B-Line is the next best option, operationally and practically. Relatively little of the aforementioned train line negatives but the provision of a train like service with well spread-out stops (stations) and significantly free flowing. Some services have been lost and for some it now means a change of buses, however one suspects, for the very large majority, their total journey times in comfort have been significantly reduced and rarely have I observed people standing in the aisles which is, anyway, common to most public transport offerings during peak hours. Possibly improved feeder services are required using smaller (say 20 seats) buses. Why bus services on

our often-narrow local roads use almost empty, large buses defeats me.

Yes, we have well considered and introduced Yellow Beauties and all those thankful for them should indeed think clearly how they should vote in relation to this topic.

I also agree with Paul Baker's (Dec '22) sentiments that "The Acknowledgement to Country" is divisive rather than inclusive and encourages inequality. 

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Head Above Water Founder 'Wardy' in Collaroy Rockpool

Community Wardy's lifesaving water baby turns 5

The Head Above Water 24 Hour Swimathon returns to Collaroy Rockpool for the fifth year, after raising over \$540,000 from 2019 to 2022 for mental fitness programs across the Northern Beaches and throughout Australia.

Head Above Water was founded by Collaroy Plateau local Andrew 'Wardy' Ward and a bunch of his good mates in response to the high rate of suicide on the Northern Beaches and the mental health challenges faced by many in the community.

As Wardy says, "Having faced my own challenges, I wanted to create an event that combined physical activity with the power of community to make a positive difference to people's lives. And so, the idea of the Head Above Water 24-hour swim was born."

Over the last five years, Head Above Water has partnered with Gotcha4Life (founded by TV and Radio personality, Gus Worland) to help fund mental fitness workshops, presentations and training including Man Anchor, Tomorrow Man and Tomorrow Woman, as well as directly funding courses from the Sit (formerly Meditation for Men) and Peerhear telehealth services.

From 2019 to 2022, over 270 programs have been facilitated, reaching 8,750 men, women, boys and girls across Northern Beaches schools, sports clubs, businesses, and community groups. This work is ensuring we all strive for a healthier and more meaningful life, for ourselves and those around us, helping address the tragic reality that eight people in Australia lose their life to suicide every day. To that end, in recognition of the positive effect that Head Above Water is having, Wardy was the recipient of the 2023 Outstanding Community Award at the Northern Beaches Australia Day Awards. Much deserved recognition not only for him, but for all volunteers, sponsors and partners that help make Head Above Water the success that it is.

This year's swim begins at 9am on Saturday, March 4th and will finish at 9am on Sunday, March 5th. There are four lanes to cater for all levels of swimming ability and people can choose to swim as many, or as few laps as they like. From 9am to 10am there will be the hotly contested Team Relay where some of the peninsula's finest sports clubs, swimming clubs, surf clubs, fitness clubs and schools will compete to be crowned relay champions.

When it comes to fundraising, every swimmer can raise money via their own sponsorship page or can form a team to raise even more money. This year, there is over \$5,000 worth of prizes up for grabs and any individual swimmer who raises over \$300 is automatically in the draw

for a chance to win their share.

Every donation helps create stronger connections and makes a positive difference throughout the community; every \$40 raised funds a participant to attend a workshop, every \$75 raised funds a 1-hour session with a qualified counsellor, every \$700 raised funds a 6-week meditation course and every \$4,000 raised funds 2 x 50- person workshops.

State Politics

Mayor Regan, running for Wakehurst

Michael Regan is excited about what the community can achieve if he is elected as the Independent Member for Wakehurst at the State Election on 25 March. Having served as local Mayor for 14 years, he points to the many successes that he, the Council and the community have achieved together in that time.

"From creating accessible playgrounds to renovating surf clubs; investing in the arts, improving sporting facilities, protecting the environment and completing our iconic Narrabeen boardwalk, the list of community achievements is a long one" he says. "We saved ratepayers millions of dollars by installing solar panels and switching to 100% renewable power. This is good for the environment but also good for Council's bottom line."

Michael says all these achievements culminated in Council being awarded the prestigious A.R Bluett Award at the end of 2022 as the most progressive Council in all of NSW! Michael now wants to take that experience and local knowledge to the State level.

"Imagine what the community of Wakehurst can achieve together by having a strong, independent voice stand up for us in State Parliament."

Michael says many of the big challenges facing Wakehurst aren't based at a Council level but instead require State Government input and approvals. "In the next few years there are some big challenges facing the Wakehurst electorate. We already know the smart solutions exist. It just requires experience and commitment to get things done."

Michael will be focussing on 6 key areas during the campaign:

Fixing the Bottlenecks: addressing significant traffic congestion and public transport problems. He has put forward a plan to have a bypass built at the Officeworks intersection in Dee Why to alleviate congestion on Pittwater Road. Similarly, he wants to establish a community task force to review the privatisation of public transport systems.

Protect the Environment and create Vibrant Communities: Michael points to the fact that just before Christmas the Liberal Government approved the bulldozing of 45 football fields of bushland in Belrose to build 400 homes in a bushfire zone. "We need an independent voice

to speak up against such massive overdevelopment that goes against the Government's own processes. We need to protect our unique environment and ensure the planning for Frenchs Forest and Brookvale deliver vibrant urban centres with appropriate infrastructure and fantastic public facilities."

Housing Affordability: provide better housing options for all, from downsizers to first home buyers to housing for our essential workers. Lower Energy Bills: make rooftop solar power more affordable by offering \$15,000 interest-free loans without a cap or postcode qualification and create community battery options for all.

Climate Protection: proper planning to protect our homes and community from inundation, flooding and bushfires.

Health and Education: fund and support our vital healthcare, NDIS, aged care and public education workers and support our mental health services.

Michael says his track record speaks for itself. "I have the experience and negotiating skills to work with all parties at every level of Government. As an independent, I will be guided only by my community. We deserve that strong independent voice to stand up for Wakehurst."

Harry's ready to ride over 400km for country kids

The countdown is officially on, with Royal Far West's annual Ride for Country Kids fundraising event taking place this month.

The Ride aims to raise awareness and vital funds to support Royal Far West, the Manlybased charity whose work connects country children to the vital services they need to support their early development and enrich their lives.

This year's event will run from 12-14 March and see cyclists ride over 400km through the stunning Snowy Mountains region. Each year, the Ride takes participants into the country communities Royal Far West serves, giving them the opportunity to hear stories, take in the views and experience life away from the city. This year's route will see participants ride from Cooma to Lake Hume Village, with stops in Thredbo and Tumbarumba.

26-year-old Harry Hawthorne is one of the riders busy in training for the event. The Northern Beaches local works in the facilities team at Royal Far West, but his connection to the organisation runs much deeper with his grandfather, uncle, dad, and brother all former or current employees.

"My grandfather Col worked here for over 20 years, my uncle Stu for 10 years, my dad Daryl has been here for over 40 years, and I've been working alongside him for almost five years now, with my brother Tom doing casual work with us. My parents also met here!"

Harry has worked on the event for the last three years as a support crew driver, but this year he decided to shake things up and join as a rider.

"I kind of got over sitting in the car and felt like I could get it done, so decided this year I would give it a go. Looking at this year's course, it's a bigger challenge than expected but I'm ready to take it on." It's no small feat, with this being Harry's first time on a road bike. He admits it's taken some getting used to, but plenty of training has helped him prepare for the long and steep route ahead.

So, what's he looking forward to? For him the amazing scenery and the chance to prove himself with this massive challenge. Of course, a big reason is also to give back to Royal Far West and the amazing work they do in supporting country kids and their families.

Country communities have had a tough couple of years affected by floods, bushfires, and other natural disasters. The impact of these disasters, coupled with the limited availability of services, has seen the number of country kids in need of developmental and mental health services drastically increase.

Right now, 190,000 children across rural and remote Australia have health and developmental needs that can't be met because of where they live. The Ride and the fundraising efforts of the riders help to directly support Royal Far West's work in connecting country kids with complex, undiagnosed developmental and mental health needs to the critical services and support they need to thrive.

Royal Far West has over 120 paediatric clinicians who provide services at the centre for country kids in Manly, virtually via telehealth and in-community. A vote for change

When Kelly Lewis founded Flying Ruby Events 12 years ago, little did she know how strong the ties to her Northern Beaches' community would become.

Kelly Lewis is a force. Full of positivity and purpose, she launched her Northern Beachesbased company Flying Ruby Events 12 years ago and has never looked back. Not surprisingly, she's also seen/done it all.

"We've produced so many different styles of events over the years, from large-scale gala dinners to intimate cocktail parties, fundraising events and brand activations," she explains. "I've built a billboard made from burgers, produced python bath activations, and suspended a dinner table from a 50m-high crane."

But that's all part of the charm of the events industry for Kelly – no two events, or days for that matter, are ever the same. "One day, we're having meetings on how to build and style an upside-down house and trying to figure out how many rubber duckies fit into a 180-litre bath," she continues. "And the next, we're writing a script for an MC and developing a menu for him because he's pescatarian and only eats food on a blue plate," she laughs.

It's Kelly and her team's ability to make each event appear seamless that has led to Flying Ruby's enduring success. "For us, it really is all in a day's work. I love that we're constantly working through challenges – it keeps us on our toes. Little do people know how much goes into running one, or what's happening behind the scenes. People just turn up and enjoy themselves and for us, that's our job done. Our only mission is to make sure every single person who walks through the door of one of our events has the best time."

With such a high-stress, high-energy, early-morning, late-night job, how does Kelly wind down? Manly-born-and-Collaroy-Plateaubred, it's not surprising the beach is her place of rest, although she's reluctant to reveal which one exactly "because then it won't be a secret anymore". She also loves a little homewares shopping, "particularly at Emporium Avenue in Balgowlah," she admits. "Although, if I bring home another cushion from there, I may end up divorced," she jokes.

But mostly, she and her family love to explore what's on their doorstep. "I have lived on the Northern Beaches my whole life. Actually, that's

And that, sorry-not-sorry, is just it. And yes – this piece was going to be a season preview about Manly. And that's how it largely turned out.



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

The NSW government, the feds, the Caymans, and Australia's worst privatisation unveiled

Forking out \$1.2bn to build a hospital then flogging it for zero must surely make the NSW government the most hopeless dealmaker in Australian history. Then letting the buyers sell it, along with another 41 hospitals to the Cayman Islands, puts the federal government in a nearby league.

Suave corporate types having their way with unwitting bureaucrats and politicians is nothing new, but this could be the worst deal in the history of Australian politics. It is certainly the most bizarre transaction this reporter has seen in a lifetime covering business, politics, and privatisations.

The deal - for this large and valuable chunk of state land was done for the princely price of \$1. Which begs the question, has the NSW government demanded its pound of flesh? The \$1 a year in rent since 2018, that is, as laid out in the lease. The documents do say "If demanded."

It is no wonder the transaction documents were hard to find, embarrassing as they are. And it was not us who found them but rather, Andrew Gill, whose family has fought for justice since their 14 year old son Josh passed away in 2021 after a stint at the Northern Beaches Hospital (NBH). They brought a private criminal prosecution against the operators in February 2022. The case was settled within a few weeks of it commencing with no money going to the Gill family.

Several months after the case was settled, the NSW government announced \$11.4

million to boost Northern Beaches youth mental health services. This was to include "four dedicated acute paediatric specialist mental health beds at NBH, which will provide for the establishment and operation of the beds."

Gill had searched the public register of the Land Titles Office. "The trick was to search the legal entity of the operator as the land title folio reference is hard to find because it was converted crown/state land." The state of NSW spent \$1.2bn in public money building the hospital and surrounding roadworks.

Land titles documents show they leased the hospital – with all its operating theatres, private clinics, public wards, and retail venues – to the foreign financial players for 20 years for the token sum of \$1 a year. The carpark is leased for \$1 a year for 40 years.

But the controversy over the privatisation took a strange turn in the wake of the leases to Healthscope. At the state level, the strategy had been to restructure the local hospital network so the other two local hospitals were shut, Manly and Mona Vale, handing an essential services monopoly to the private operators as all traffic would be funneled directly to the new hospital.

Healthscope had been listed on the ASX, and been juggled through the hands of private equity players twice. This had made it a plaything for investment bankers as Australia's super fund investors had been enticed into buying the stock yet, when it performed poorly

it was taken private on the cheap and refloated on the ASX again for a profit for its financiers (and losses for the super funds). Then, in 2019, months after the \$1 leases were signed on NBH and its carpark, the American financial engineering juggernaut Brookfield launched a takeover bid for Healthscope and its 42 hospitals.

A dark and secret labyrinth

Although the other 41 hospitals were private hospitals (still subsidised by the public through the private health system) the NBH was a hybrid asset, a public/private hospital. For the takeover to proceed – as Brookfield is a Canadian operator listed on Wall Street – it required federal government approval, via Treasury's Foreign Investment Review Board (FIRB), which it duly procured. FIRB is something of a rubber stamp when it comes to foreign takeover players. So, even though Brookfield has a history of tax avoidance in this country, FIRB approved the \$4bn takeover and the NBH was bound for control in a tax haven from that moment.

Andrew Gill says the transactions not only lacked transparency but left these vital public assets in the hands of those who had little accountability. "The hospital is owned by a Cayman Island listed entity and is not accountable to our local, state or federal democratic system. There is no way of knowing how much the government pays the private company that operates the public portion of the hospital. When you request such information from it or the government, they both claim that it is commercial in confidence! This is our money being paid to a company whose sole motive is to make profit in the context of caring for sick people. Surely this information is front and centre public."

For the financiers to conceal the financial transactions, Brookfield came up with a structure which is virtually impenetrable in which to secrete its Australian assets. Buried in the disclosures to the ASX is that the ultimate controlling company, which can be searched on public databases, is BCP VIG Holdings L.P, whose address is Ugland House, Grand Cayman, a building which accounts for the corporate addresses of thousands of other companies.

The ultimate parent company in Australia is ANZ Hospitals Topco, owned by BCP VIG Holdings in the Caymans. The operating company appears to be NBH Operator Co Pty Ltd, which is in turn owned by NBH Holdco Pty Ltd, in turn owned by ANZ Hospitals Topco. There were another two shareholders in this entity besides BCP VIG. These are ANZ HT - owned also by Brookfield HSO Co-invest II LP - and ANZ Hospitals BTCO Pty Ltd.

Why such a tortuous corporate structure? To hide things. Indeed, the Caymans company is a dead end in public terms because there is no duty to disclose either shareholders or directors in Cayman Island entities. This is also why it is still not known who the financial beneficiaries are of the controversial \$80m sale of Australian water rights to a Caymans company set up by former minister, now Shadow Treasurer Angus Taylor, by the department run by former prime minister Barnaby Joyce.

But we digress. The problem with this grand failure of accountability in privatising public assets is that, as Andrew Gill says, hospitals are not like other financial assets in that the principal duty of care ought to be the health of patients. The principal duty for corporate directors - particularly in the aggressive pursuit of profits which is the business of private equity players - is to maximise wealth for shareholders.

Since the Brookfield structure was set up, the only significant person with a health or hospital background is gone. Originally, the board comprised mostly finance types: Eleni Labridis (ex financial engineering group Babcock & Brown, and Alinta), Richard Holbeach (who is a mergers and acquisitions specialist with a power industry background and who was involved with the public float of Medibank) and David Allison (finance background who was involved with Healthscope from 2003 to 2018).

They have expanded since, although Steven Rubic, the former chief executive who has a track record in the private health sector has been replaced by Greg Horan who has a coal industry background and was formerly head of Brookfield Asset Management's private equity division. These are the people who have been controlling the Healthscope hospitals in Australia. But who controls them? We don't know this as searches end in the dark zone for corporate accountability...the Caribbean island of Grand Cayman.

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The prospect for home loan repayment blues is concerning

Mortgage stress predicted to increase as inflation keeps biting

After the Reserve Bank of Australia's announcement to increase the cash rate target by another 25 basis points on Tuesday, 7 February to 3.35%, there are continued predictions that mortgage holders will face difficult times ahead.

The RBA's reasoning to increase interest rates further is due to high inflation figures which is increasing the cost of living, and, while mortgageholders will bear the brunt of rising interest rates, it is the rising cost of living that affect us all. This means there are budgetary pressures on household spending, particularly in households that have no savings buffer.

"If you took out a variable mortgage of \$500,000 more than a year ago, then the last nine interest rate rises by the

RBA means you're likely to be spending around \$800 more per month on repayments." says Iresha Lehane, Financial Counselling Manager at Lifeline Northern Beaches.

"For some, who took out \$1 million mortgages at a fixed rate of 2%, the interest rate may increase to almost 6% once the fixed rate period ends. This would increase repayments from \$20,000 per year to \$60,000 - in increase of \$40,000 a year." Recent reporting about mortgage payments that are

more than 30 days overdue, suggests that the highest numbers of mortgage-holders who may fall behind in their repayments on the Northern Beaches due to further increases are in Brookvale, Curl Curl, Cromer and Terrev Hills.

Inflation is the other part of the story, with the price of food, petrol, electricity, rent, goods and services all increasing significantly.

According to the RBA, "CPI inflation over the year to the December quarter was 7.8 per cent, the highest since 1990. In underlying terms, inflation was 6.9 per cent, which was higher than expected." And, while the RBA expects inflation to slow, it is more than likely that interest rate rises will continue over the coming months.

"We understand the stress that financial difficulty can place on people. It's important to assess your options and speak to your bank if there are issues with you meeting your financial obligations," continues Iresha. "You may be able to access hardship provisions through your bank or lender."

"If you've contacted your bank, there are also support services available that you can contact. like the National Debt Helpline or Lifeline Northern Beaches Financial Counselling."

Cover Artist

Where the streets have mural acclaim

Growing up heavily dyslexic, March cover artist **Patrick Hunter** developed a superpower, asking others for help, and this gift of approaching talented people and seeking to learn from them has played a priceless role in his life and his art. But a career as an artist wasn't Patrick's first choice.

"I wanted to be an actor," Patrick recalls. "I got quite a lot of work, but my last job was as an extra on Wolverine, being cinematically obliterated by an American nuclear warhead. Filming was in Cronulla." The script's atomic energy couldn't contain Patrick. "I just walked off set. I didn't want to be an extra anymore, and because there were so many extras, they could never keep track of everyone. I started walking, becoming lost in the actors' tents, before ending up in Hugh Jackman's tent where he was literally pumping his muscles to get ready for the next scene. There were 3 chicken carcasses beside him.

I guess he had to eat so much to stay massive."

True to form, Patrick wasn't going to let The Prestige encounter with The Boy from Oz pass without asking for some X-Men wisdom. "He made me stand on the elastic band he was using to pump his muscles up." Hugh was seriously jacked. "I was in a place mentally where I felt like a prop, getting pushed around, which is what I should've felt, I was an extra! But I asked him if he had the ability to choose what he does or if he also felt like a prop. Hugh said even in his position he still mostly had to do what he was told, that he didn't have much artistic freedom. and that if I truly felt like that was a deal breaker, acting probably wasn't for me."

This incredible encounter was short lived. Do-gooders aka security busted in with the usual, "Who the hell are you? What are you doing here?! Get the hell out of here!!" So predictable. "I walked off set, properly this time, and into the icy Cronulla sea breeze. I spoke with Hugh for maybe one minute, but it had a huge impact on me, gave me the clarity to commit to the arts and especially to street art, where the creators I looked up to were leading lives with freedom and able to communicate in the way of their choosing."

Jump ahead a decade, Patrick is a street art powerhouse, creating murals able to transform public places. You've likely encountered his work on the Northern Beaches, Sydney, all over New South Wales. "I always think, how do you connect with the people around you? People are sensory beings. Music fills time. Art fills space. Food fills bellies. People connect with anything that appeals to their senses. so if you can create a piece of art that hits the senses and creates feelings, you've really got something."

As for the Tawny cover's inspiration, "I love the natural environment, and I played with the elements of surfing and painting, things I see as integral to the Northern Beaches, then morphing it into a big hand, turning over into a tube spilling from a bucket. I feel like the Northern Beaches has an amazing amount of musicians and artists, but that hand in the tube is representing a hand holding them back, that there's a lack of opportunity given to local artists by stagnant spaces."

Hear! Hear! More murals, less stagnation.

Toby, tell us about Adventure Entertainment and how you started the company.

Adventure Entertainment is a digital media business focused on adventure sports. We distribute films, publish a series of magazines including Wild, operate a streaming platform (ADVENTURE+) and more. I was a corporate lawyer when the idea came to me - stuck at my desk and aspiring to get out and adventure more. There was a lot of adventure content out there and I decided to bring that to Australia to inspire more people to adventure - and hopefully care more about the environment that we play in as well!

REEL ROCK is a series of short films centred around adventure sports and rock climbing. This year's line-up has an international flavour, taking people on a journey from Pakistan and Austria to France and Palestine following some of the world's best climbers. Do you rock climb? What do you think people love about the sport so much?

I'm a casual adventurer and enjoy many sports including climbing, without necessarily being an expert at any of them. People love climbing for the challenge that it offers as well as the social element of catching up with friends.

What is it about extreme sport on film that brings people together?

What's the best way to connect with other people in adventure sports?

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Lean on me (except when it's dysfunctional)

Breaking down the types of dependence in relationships

Know anybody who is a bit of a lone wolf? Perhaps you've got a colleague who acts like a baby? Or maybe you know a friend who seems to be surgically attached at the hip to their partner?

All of these behaviours are reflective of different types of dependency playing out in real life. In functional families we are taught things at age-appropriate levels so that by the time we reach adulthood, we can take care of ourselves. Unfortunately, this doesn't always happen, and some ships sail before we jump on them. Let's breakdown the archetypes to better understand how people show up in relationship.

The Baby (dependent) – An adult who is almost or completely dependent on others to get their needs met. Usually, this person was babied by a parent and still carries expectations to be cared for in the same way from a spouse.

The Conjoined Twin (co-dependent) – Two adults who mutually rely on each other (often in a romantic relationship) to an unhealthy and dysfunctional extent where they place their entire worth, meaning and identity in the other's hands. In real life this sounds like "I don't know what I'd do without you".

The Lone Wolf (anti-dependent) – A person who is incredibly self-sufficient but often denies, refuses, or rejects help when offered, especially when it would be to their benefit.

The Handyman (independent) – A person with sufficient skills to take care of themselves but is open and willing to receive help from others and be in connection.

The Soldier (inter-dependent) – A person who shows independence, autonomy and has built healthy relationships and social networks as part of an infrastructure to be well connected and supported.

The baby, conjoined twin and lone wolf archetypes develop out of a childhood where functional and healthy dependence was poorly or inadequately role modeled. The baby often has everything done for them way beyond what

is age appropriate, thus they never learn to do things for themselves. The conjoined twin often lacks self-esteem and relies on others to prop themselves up in the world and borrow a bit of identity, so they don't have to address underlying issues of feeling worthless. The wolf often did not have their needs met and learned that they can't rely on others and need to take care of themselves.

These three archetypes have risks and cost. The baby and twin's biggest risk is abandonment, and the wolf's cost is isolation and loneliness. As these three types are less functional, it can be very challenging to be in a relationship to a person and feel equal. This can greatly impact your ability to communicate, parent and be intimate.

The reward of the handyman and solider is freedom, autonomy, connection. Harmony and happiness are much more likely when operating out of these archetypes. The good news is, through knowledge, self-awareness, and application you can step up and be whoever you want. So, take a moment to reflect on your relationship and ask your partner. Which archetype do you most resonate with and does your partner agree?

No-mato Sauce

Top Tip: When using organic organic carrots and beets you don't need to peel the skin off because that's where a lot of the nutrients are.

Method:

1. Preheat the oven to 180° and place the diced carrots, beets, red capsicum and garlic cloves into a large mixing bowl. Add 3 tbsp olive oil, fresh thyme leaves, ground cumin, kosher salt, and black pepper. Stir until all vegetables are evenly coated with oil, spice and herbs. 2. Brush a large rimmed baking tray with remaining 1 tbsp olive oil. Spread the vegetables out evenly on the baking sheet with sprigs of rosemary on top.

3. Roast the vegetables in the oven for 15mins before tossing them and returning them for another 15-25mins or until tender and the edges are starting to turn golden/dark.

4. When the vegetables are done roasting, saute the onion in a large saucepan and add the roasted veggies along with the diced apple, salt and any other Italian herbs to taste. Add water to cover the veggies and bring to a rolling boil. 5. Puree, serve and freeze leftovers.

You won't believe how Irrawong feels so right

Secret Spaces Hidden Places

Under the rainforest canopy at Irrawong Reserve

Think you know the Northern Beaches? Our monthly feature aims to help you uncover the unique spaces and places in our very own backyard.

Enjoy a moment of respite in this hidden oasis, tucked away in the backroads of Narrabeen. With the Ingleside escarpment to the west and the Warriewood Wetlands to the east, this protected nature reserve is home to over 207 unique species and a threatened but unique forest vegetation community.

Wander along the trail, spotting eastern water dragons, as you wind your way towards the gentle trickle of the Irrawong Waterfall. It's a perfect place for a picnic on the sandy shore of the natural pool amidst high sandstone cliffs. Stop for a swim, or listen to the laughter of the kookaburras or the softer call of the eastern yellow robin - just some of the 166 birds in this area.

Further into the reserve, look out for lyrebirds on the steep set of steps to the right of the waterfall which wind through a dense canopy of forest towards Ingleside Park, adjacent to Mullet Creek.

Offshoots of the trail are unofficial but relatively wellmarked, steep track sections which lead you to the top of Irrawong Waterfall. If you're up for some rock scrambling, you can continue on from the top of the waterfall, winding your way along Mullet Creek towards a second, unnamed waterfall.

For a more gentle meander, the Jim Revitt trail winds its way from the waterfall towards Garden Street or vice versa, following sections of well-trodden trail and boardwalk perched above the dense ground layer of ferns, tall grasses and reeds.

Did you know...

The last recording of a koala in the Irrawong Reserve was in 1992, according to a Pittwater Council report. Koalas favour 'swamp mahogany' as a favoured food tree species in the Sydney region, which is a dominant feature of the Irrawong Reserve. 'Swamp mahogany' trees are also part of the Swamp Sclerophyll Forest which is one of the reserve's diverse vegetation communities and is listed under the NSW Threatened Species Conservation Act.

How to get there

You can enter Irrawong Reserve from Garden Street or the end of Irrawong Road. On Garden Street, you'll see a stone marking the entrance to the start of the Jim Revitt trail which takes about 20 minutes to reach the Irrawong Waterfall. From the end of Irrawong Road, either take a left at the trailhead to reach Irrawong Waterfall and the connecting trails or turn right to explore the boardwalk which connects you back to Garden Street.

Note: Dogs and cats are prohibited at all times in the Irrawong reserve.

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
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Tawny's Bathtub Bookclub

FOUND: Swiping right on me to find love by Julie Demsey



FOUND is the product of Julie's post-divorce foray into finding men to date. She was looking for some fun and interesting company, not a life partner, and sex was also on her to do list. Reading about Julie losing her post-divorce virginity is one of many highlights of FOUND. Dating apps (and downs) and the hundreds of mostly awful men she meets make for hilarious and often excruciating reading but what makes her book inspiring is how she discovered herself and what matters most to her and how this has transformed her life. There are many lessons to be learned from Julie's experience no matter your age, stage, gender or desire for dating.



You're Doing Great Sweetie by Kirsty Stewart

Kirsty wrote this book in a hurry when she was 26 years old as a way of processing some bad sh*t that happened to her. She updated it at a slower pace when she was 28 and added the descriptor about it being a guide to being a functional adult. One of the big ideas in this book is own up to yourself and stop blaming others. That's adulting in a nutshell. 




